Whitbread ignore East London

BEER lovers in the North West of England are now celebrating the launch of a cask-conditioned beer for the area, the first real beer they have supplied there for many vears.

Likewise drinkers in the Midlands and the North Whitbread's Marlow brewery East are finding traditional Whitbread beers increasingly easy to come

But despite all this new enthusiasm for real beer from Whitbread there is still one area where not one Whitbread pub sells unpressurized beer -East London.

1975 Whitbread supplied cask-conditioned Trophy Bitter to the majority of their London pubs, though almost everywhere it was spoilt by being pushed up. to the bar by carbon dioxide top pressure instead of being pulled up by the traditional beer engine.

When Chiswell Street closed a much inferior keg for while the City busi-

version of Trophy from the firm's huge chemical works in Luton was introduced in London and real beer disappeared from Whitbread pubs here. But protests from landlords and campaigning by CAMRA soon led to traditional beer from being sold in the few pubs which had retained handpumps.

WETHEREDS BITTER

The growing popularity of real beer in London led to a large increase in the amount of Marlow beer brought in, and now many City, West End and West East London.

Until the historic London pubs have now chiswell Street brewery in handpumps restored to sell the beer, known as Trophy

The City was closed in the beer, known as Trophy in the Marlow area and initially called Whitbread Draught Bitter in London, where it has now been re-named Thomas Wethered's Draught Bitter.

TOO GOOD FOR EAST LONDON

Whitbread obviously consider that real ale is too good for East London,
