ALONGSIDE the growth in the availability of traditional draught beer in pubs during the last five or six years there has also been a revival in the consumption of real ale at home.

Twenty years ago it was commonplace for people to take jugs or empty quart flagons to their local to be filled with handpumped beer to drink at home - in fact, many pubs had a "Bottle & Jug Department". But the growing availability of canned beer led to this practice all but dying out in London.

Now, however, people are becoming more concerned about the quality of the beer they drink at home and at parties, and many publicans who take a pride in their traditional such off licences in East beer are filling customers London - the Two Brewers bottles or gallon plastic containers with draught beer.
