Meanwhile, further South in Birmingham the world's largest real-ale brewery, Bass-subsidiary Mitchells and Butlers, is busy converting its pubs, which previously all sold cask beer, to keg and tank beers and curtailing production of real ale at their Cape Hill brewery.

The significance for London of this is that since the closure of the Charringtons brewery in Mile End the two Charringtons cask bitters. IPA and Crown, have been brewed by M&B at Cape Hill, so that the trend towards processed beer in Birmingham poses a grave threat to hundreds of Charringtons pubs in the
